### FLORIDA STATE PLAYS HOST TO DUKE IN BATTLE OF NATIONALLY RANKED TEAMS

No. 9 Florida State, which has won a school-record tying 11 consecutive games, plays host to No. 7 Duke on Tuesday, January 10, 2017 at 8:00 p.m. at the Donald L. Tucker Center. The Seminoles enter Tuesday's game with a 15-1 record, an undefeated 3-0 mark in ACC play and have won each of their last 11 games with its winning streak having started on Nov. 25, 2016 with a 72-61 win over Illinois in the final round of the NIT Season Tip-Off at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn. In addition, the Seminoles have won 14 consecutive games at home (11 during the 2016-17 season and the final three of the 2015-16 season). Florida State comes into Tuesday's game fresh off a 93-78 victory over No. 21/23 Virginia Tech on Saturday in Tallahassee in which the earned their second consecutive victory over a nationally ranked opponent. The Seminoles defeated No. 11/11 Virginia on December 31 in Charlottesville to gain their first ACC road victory of the season. The Seminoles have now defeated three ranked teams so far this season - No. 21/21 Florida (83-78, December 11), No. 11/11 Virginia (60-58, December 31) and No. 21/23 Virginia Tech (93-78, January 7). Following Tuesday's night's game against Duke, the Seminoles travel to play No. 14/16 North Carolina during its gauntlet of playing six consecutive nationally ranked teams. The Seminoles are 2-0 in the first two games of its ACC schedule against six nationally ranked teams.

### SEMINOLE COACHES SUPPORTING COACHING FOR LITERACY

Members of Florida State's coaching staff are wearing bright green wristbands and lapel pins in support of Coaching for Literacy, a program designed to raise awareness about illiteracy in America and also generate financial support for effective, local literacy programs. Florida State has joined forces with over 25 other NCAA schools and the Washington Wizards as a partner of the Coaching for Literacy and its Assistant Coach Program. The program achieves the mission of the organization by permitting individuals to receive an all-access fan experience in exchange for a donation to a local literacy initiative. The Seminole men's basketball program and the Early Learning Coalition of the Big Bend Region have joined forces to raise awareness about the number of people who are functionally or totally illiterate in the United States.

### BEST STARTS IN SCHOOL HISTORY

Florida State's 15-1 start to the 2016-17 season matches the best 16-game start in school history. The Seminoles have started two different seasons with 15-1 records (1988-89 and 2016-17). The 1988-89 team, which played in the 1989 NCAA Tournament, won 16 of their first 17 games (16-1) before suffering their second loss. Florida State's 15-1 start under head coach Leonard Hamilton marks the best start for a Hamilton coached team at Florida State.

### SEMINOLES EARN HIGHEST IN-SEASON RANKING SINCE 1992-93 SEASON

No. 9 Florida State, which is 6-1 while playing as a nationally ranked team this season, enters Tuesday's game against No. 7 Duke with its highest in-season ranking since the 1992-93 season when it was ranked as high as No. 7 in the nation in finishing in second place in the ACC standings and advancing to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament. Florida State is 15-1 for only the second time in school history - the Seminoles started out 16-1 during the 1988-89 season -- and are 3-0 in ACC play for the first time since joining the league in 1991. The Seminoles became the first ACC team to reach the 15-win plateau and sit on top of the standings entering their game against Duke. Florida State won two conference games in the month of December for the first time in school history.

### BACON'S DOUBLE FIGURE STEAK HIS 25 CONSECUTIVE GAMES

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon scored 17 points in Florida State's 93-78 victory over No. 21/23 Virginia Tech on Saturday in Tallahassee and has scored in double figures in a career-best and current ACC-best 25 consecutive games. He has scored in double figures in each of the Seminoles' games since Feb. 17, 2016 when he totaled 10 points against Georgia Tech in Tallahassee. Bacon has scored 433 points during his streak (17.3 ppg) and scored his career-high of 29 points in Florida State's victory over No. 11/11 Virginia - including three on a buzzer-beating game-winning shot with two seconds remaining in the game to give the Seminoles the win.

**FLORIDA STATE'S WIN TOTAL IN THE LAST 11 YEARS**

Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last 11 years (since the start of the 2005-06 season) in total games played as a member of the ACC with 246 wins. The Seminoles average 21.2 wins per season with records of 20-10 (2005-06), 22-13 (2006-07), 19-15 (2007-08), 25-10 (2008-09), 22-10 (2009-10), 23-11 (2010-11), 25-10 (2011-12), 18-16 (2012-13), 22-14 (2013-14), 17-16 (2014-15), 20-14 (2015-16) and 14-1 (2016-17).

**LOOK FOR FLORIDA STATE TO...**

...Defeat No. 7 Duke and gain its school-record 12<sup>th</sup> consecutive victory. It would surpass the current school record of 11 consecutive victories during the 1969-70 season;

...Defeat No. 7 Duke and gain a victory over its fourth ranked team of the season. It would mark the first time since the 2011-12 season that they would have defeated at least four ranked teams in a single season. The Seminoles defeated six ranked teams (including then No. 4 and then No. 6 ranked Duke) on their way to winning the first-ever ACC Tournament Championship;

...Defeat No. 7 Duke and improve its ACC record to 4-0 for the first time in school history;

...Defeat No. 7 Duke and gain a win over a top-10 ranked team for the first time since defeating No. 10 VCU, 85-67, in the first round of the Puerto Rico Shootout on Nov. 21, 2013;

...Defeat No. 7 Duke and defeat a top-10 ranked team at home for the first time since a 90-57 victory over No. 3 North Carolina on Jan. 14, 2012;

...Defeat No. 7 Duke and win a third consecutive game against a nationally ranked opponent for the second time in school history. The 1971-72 Seminoles gained wins over No. 11 Minnesota (70-56, NCAA Tournament Sweet 16, March 16, 1972), No. 18 Kentucky (73-54, NCAA Tournament Elite Eight, March 18, 1972) and No. 2 North Carolina (79-75, NCAA Tournament Semifinals, March 24, 1972). The Seminoles fell to No. 1 ranked UCLA in the 1972 NCAA Championship game, 81-76, at the Sports Arena in Los Angeles, Calif.

**SEMINOLES GAUNTLET AGAINST SIX CONSECUTIVE NATIONALLY RANKED TEAMS**

Florida State plays host to No. 7 Duke in the midst of one of the most challenging schedules in the history of the ACC. Between Dec. 31 and January 21 the Seminoles are playing or will play six consecutive nationally ranked opponents – at No. 11 Virginia (60-58 win, December 31 in Charlottesville), against No. 21/23 Virginia Tech (93-78 win, January 7), No. 8/8 Duke (January 10), No. 14/16 North Carolina (January 14 in Chapel Hill), No. 23/23 Notre Dame (January 18 in Tallahassee) and No. 9.9 Louisville (January 21 in Tallahassee). In ACC history, only the 1992-93 Maryland Terrapins (0-6) and the 1979-80 NC State Wolfpack (2-4) have played six consecutive ACC opponents during the regular season.

**SEMINOLES AND HAMILTON AGAINST RANKED DUKE TEAMS**

Florida State enters Tuesday's game against No. 7 Duke with 33 wins over ranked teams during the 15-year tenure of Leonard Hamilton at Florida State. Included in those 33 wins over ranked teams are six wins over nationally ranked Duke teams including a win over the No. 6 ranked Blue Devils (March 10, 2012, 62-59) in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament at Philips Arena in Atlanta. The Seminoles defeated No. 4 North Carolina one day later to win the first ACC Championship in school history.

**FLORIDA STATE AS A RANKED TEAM THIS SEASON**

Florida State, which enters Tuesday's game against No. 7 Duke with its highest national ranking of the season (No. 12/13), will play as a ranked team for the eighth time of the 2016-17 season against the Blue Devils. The Seminoles are 6-1 and have won six consecutive games as a ranked team this season. Florida State's game against the Blue Devils marks their fourth home game of the 2016-17 season as a ranked team and their highest ranking in a game played at the Donald L. Tucker Center since Saturday when they defeated Virginia Tech as the nation's 12<sup>th</sup>-highest ranked team. Florida State was ranked as high as No. 7 in the Associated Press poll during the 1992-93 season.

**FLORIDA STATE VS. DUKE – THE LAST MEETING**

Grayson Allen scored 18 points, Brandon Ingram added 16 and Duke defeated the Seminoles 80-65 on February 25, 2016 at Cameron Indoor Stadium in Durham, N.C. Marshall Plumlee had 13 points and 10 rebounds for the Blue Devils. The Blue Devils placed five players in double figures for the first time in league play and forced 14 turnovers while matching a season low with five themselves. Luke Kennard finished with 12 points and Matt Jones added 11 in his first game back from injury for Duke, which has won six of seven. Freshman guard Dwayne Bacon had 12 points and 10 rebounds, Xavier Rathan-Mayes scored 13 and Devon Bookert finished with 10 points for the Seminoles. Florida State never got closer than 11 in the second half, the last time coming on Bookert's jumper at the 10-minute mark. Florida State enters Tuesday's game against Duke at the Donald L. Tucker Center having won 14 consecutive home games. The Seminoles have won each of their 11 games played at home this season and were victorious in their final three home games of the 2015-16 season against No. 20 Notre Dame (Feb. 27, 2016), Syracuse (March 5, 2016) and against Davidson in the first round of the NIT (March 15, 2016).

**NOTING FLORIDA STATE'S VICTORIES**

Florida State has won 11 of its 15 games by double figures with two of its ACC victories coming by 15 points (93-78 over Virginia Tech) and 16 points (88-72 over Wake Forest) and enjoys a +17.9 points per game scoring margin.

Florida State enters Tuesday's game against Duke ranked second in the ACC in scoring with an 86.6 points per game scoring average. **FLORIDA STATE DEFENSIVELY**

Florida State enters Tuesday's game against Duke ranked third in the ACC in steals (8.1), fourth in the ACC in blocked shots (5.2) and fourth in the ACC in field goal percentage defense (.389). In ranking third in steals, Florida State has earned double figures in steals in seven of 16 games. In ranking fourth in blocked shots, the Seminoles have blocked six or more shots in eight different games this season. In ranking fourth in the ACC in field goal percentage defense, the Seminoles have held each of their first 16 opponents below 47 percent shooting from the field. Only two teams – Temple (.468 on November 24) and Florida (.468 on December 11) – have shot above 46 percent from the field against the Seminoles. Florida State has held six opponents under 40 percent shooting from the field this season. The Seminoles and Syracuse are the only two teams in the ACC to rank in the top five of each of the three defensive categories (steals, blocked shots and field goal percentage defense). Syracuse ranks first in steals, third in blocked shots and fifth in field goal percentage defense.

**SEMINOLES' DEFENSIVE HISTORY**

Florida State led the nation and the ACC in field goal percentage defense during both the 2009-10 (.377) and 2010-11 seasons (.363) and played in the NCAA Tournament during both seasons. Seminole head coach Leonard Hamilton led the Miami Hurricanes to the nation's best field goal percentage defense mark and to the NCAA Tournament in 1998.

**SEMINOLES GOING TO THE BOARDS**

Florida State is one of the top rebounding teams in the ACC and enters Tuesday's game against Duke tied for fifth in the ACC in rebounding margin. The Seminoles have earned a positive rebounding margin in eight consecutive games including a +14 margin in their victories over Iona (November 15) and Manhattan (83-67 on December 17) in the Orange Bowl Classic. The Seminoles have recorded a double-digit rebounding margin in six of their 16 games and have out rebounded each of the ranked teams they have defeated this season (+9 against Florida, +1 against Virginia and +5 against Virginia Tech).

### NOTING BACON'S 25-GAME DOUBLE FIGURE SCORING STREAK

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon has scored in double figures in 25 consecutive games entering Tuesday's game against Duke. His streak is the 19<sup>th</sup> longest streak in school history and is one game longer than the 24-game double figure scoring streak by Malik Beasley during the 2015-16 season. Bacon's scoring streak is the longest current streak in the ACC. Dave Fedor, who scored in double figures in each game during his Seminole career, scored in double figures in a school-record 72 consecutive games. Next up for Bacon is the 26-game consecutive scoring streak by Harry Davis during the last three games of the 1976-77 season and the first 23 games of the 1977-78 season.

### BACON'S IMPROVED NUMBERS

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon has illustrated his competitiveness and drive in his second season as a Seminole on the court since scoring 23 points on four made 3-point field goals in the Seminoles' season-opening victory over Charleston Southern (Nov. 12). Bacon, the eighth-leading scorer in the ACC with a 25-game double figure scoring streak entering Tuesday's game against Duke, has increased all of his personal offensive and defensive statistics while averaging fewer minutes played per game and most importantly, leading the Seminoles to a 15-1 overall record.

### SAVOY – FLORIDA STATE'S LONG RANGE SHOOTER

Sophomore PJ Savoy, who is shining in his first season as a Seminole, scored 11 points in seven minutes of play in Florida State's victory over Virginia Tech. The 11 points rank as his ACC career high and is the third time he has scored in double figures in his first nine games of the season. In the three games in which he has scored in double figures (27 against Southern Miss, 18 against Nicholls State and 11 against Virginia Tech), Savoy is shooting .533 from the 3-point line (16 of 30). He has made 22 field goals in his first nine career games with 20 coming from distance. With his three made shots from the bonusphere against Virginia Tech, he moved in to second place among his Seminole teammates for 3-point field goals made with 20.

His is the Seminoles' highest rebounding average since All-ACC Second-Team selection Bernard James averaged 8.21 rebounds per game during Florida State's ACC Championship season in 2012. Isaac has pulled down at least six rebounds in 10 of the 13 games in which he has played including five games with nine or more rebounds. He pulled down his career high of 13 rebounds in Florida State's victory over Minnesota in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge (November 28).

**ISAAC IN HIS LAST FIVE GAMES...**

...Is averaging 8.8 points (he has scored 44 total points), 7.8 rebounds (he has pulled down 39 total rebounds, 1.6 blocked shots (he has blocked eight shots including two each against Manhattan, Wake Forest and Virginia) and 1.4 steals per game (he has seven total steals) while shooting .800 percent (16 of 20) from the free throw line.

**WALKER AMONG SEMINOLE LEADERS FROM 3-POINT LINE**

Freshman CJ Walker is shooting .444 percent (four of nine from the 3-point line) in ACC play and is one of five Seminoles who has made at least 10 3-point shots this season. He made his career-high of three 3-point field goals in Florida State's victory over Wake Forest – with each of his made shots from the bonusphere give the Seminoles a lead in a game they eventually won by an 88-72 margin. Walker made one 3-point shot in the Seminoles' victory over Virginia Tech – a shot that gave his team a 10-point second half lead on their way to the 93-78 win over the Hokies.

Forrest has earned multiple steals in 11 of the Seminoles' 16 games (including each of the Seminoles' three ACC games) and totaled his career-high of four steals in Florida State's victories over Detroit Mercy (November 20) and Illinois (November 24). He has earned at least one steal in 12 of Florida State's first 16 games.

**FORREST ALSO DISHING THE BALL AT A VERY HIGH RATE**

Freshman Trent Forrest is as good at sharing the basketball as he is in taking from his opponent. He enters Tuesday's game against Duke ranked second on the team in assists with 36 and a 2.3 assists per game average. Forrest has earned at least one assists in 15 of the Seminoles' 16 games including a career-high of six assists in Florida State's victory over Southern Miss (December 6). In addition to his high assists average he has a strong 1.7:1 assist:turnover ratio with a great deal of point guard responsibilities for the Seminoles in his first season in Tallahassee.

**KOUMADJE WITH A HIGH FIELD GOAL SHOOTING PERCENTAGE**

Sophomore Chris Koumadje, who is averaging a career-high 4.1 points per game as a sophomore, enters Tuesday's game against Duke shooting a career-high .660 from the field. He has scored twice as many points this season (66 – 33) as compared to his freshman season, has already made more than twice as many field goals this season (31-13) as compared to last season and has already played more minutes in 16 games this season (182 / 11.4 mpg) than he did as a freshman (159 / 6.1 mpg).

## Exhibition 1 -- Florida State 119, Southeastern 58

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Freshman Jonathan Isaac scored 17 points and added 11 rebounds and teammate Michael Ojo contributed 14 points and 13 rebounds to lead Florida State to a 119-58 win over Southeastern in men's basketball exhibition action at the Donald L. Tucker Center. Isaac and Ojo were two of seven Seminoles to top the double-digit scoring mark, along with junior Phil Cofer, who emerged with a game-high 20 points to go along with nine rebounds. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Florida State accomplished something on Sunday that hasn't happened in Leonard Hamilton's 29 seasons and 879 games as a college coach -- hit triple digits in consecutive games. The Seminoles rolled to a 100-71 victory over Detroit Mercy as they were 40 of 70 from the field and had five players in double figures. It is the first time since December of 1996 -- against Jacksonville and Tennessee State -- that FSU has scored 100 or more in back-to-back games. It is the 15th time -- and seventh in 15 seasons at Florida State -- that a Hamilton team has reached the century mark. He accomplished it six times in four seasons at Oklahoma State and twice in 10 years at Miami. Dwayne Bacon led the Seminoles (4-0) with 22 points and freshman Jonathan Isaac got his first double-double with 14 points and 10 rebounds. Terrance Mann (11), Xavier Rathan-Mayes (10) and Trent Forrest also scored in double figures. FSU scored 100 points despite making just 1 of 14 3-pointers. They were 39 of 56 inside the perimeter and had a huge 78-26 advantage on points in the paint. A lot of the Seminoles' point points came in the transition game as they had 20 fast-break points. Florida State led 48-35 at halftime before Detroit Mercy closed within eight (64-56) with 13:13 remaining on a Chris Jenkins jumper. The Seminoles then put it out of reach with a 32-4 run over an eight-minute span. At one point it was a 22-2 run as they hit 11 straight from the field.

They came into the game 12th in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 3-point percentage at 32.9 percent but converted 48.3 percent from beyond the arc. PJ Savoy, who missed the first six games due to a turf toe injury, led the way with 27 points and was 7 of 10 from 3-point range. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Seven Seminoles scored in double figures in their 118-63 victory over Nicholls State -- the most points scored in Leonard Hamilton's 15 seasons. The previous mark was 109 set in last year's opener against Nicholls State. The 55 point margin is the seventh largest in school history. Florida State -- which won its fifth straight -- has been locked in on offense the past two games, especially from the perimeter as they have made 31 3-pointers, including 17 against Nicholls. PJ Savoy led the Seminoles in scoring for the second straight game. The sophomore junior college transfer had 18 points with all of them coming on 3-pointers. He has made 13 in the past two games. # COACHING FOR LITERACY

Illiteracy has always been a problem in the United States, one that continues to be an issue to this day.

Teaching children to read at an early age is crucial to their learning and growth. Kids today often want to stay inside and watch television or play video games, but very few ever just pick up a book and start reading.

That is why, using the power of sports, Florida State guard Xavier Rathan-Mayes and associate head coach Stan Jones have teamed up with the Coaching for Literacy program to help improve literacy among children.

"I was happy to jump on board and get Coach Hamilton involved and our program involved and try to find a way to continue to help young people learn the value and the life skills that you get out of being avid readers," Jones said.

Coaching for Literacy's goal is to raise awareness about illiteracy and raise funds to help children learn to read so that they can be successful. In the span of three years, Coaching for Literacy has directly impacted more than 7,500 children and supported 25 literary programs nationwide.

"I think it's just a great program to be able to get out there and do things with kids, to be a part of the community and help children become better people, become better in school and just teach them certain things in life," Rathan-Mayes said.

Using the sports platform is extremely beneficial for the program. Sports are very popular with young children, and when these kids see a college athlete come in and speak to them about reading and working hard, it motivates them to go out and learn.

"Sports is such a powerful tool in today's age," said Rathan-Mayes. "The fact that we have that tool and the ability to use it in different ways to affect people's lives is something I pride myself in."

As a student-athlete, Rathan Mayes knows a thing or two about putting in hard work in the classroom to see results in the real world.

"School is the key to everything; without school, without reading, it's tough to get places," Rathan-Mayes said.

"If you keep yourself focused in those areas and work hard to reach your dreams everything will fall into place."

Jones agrees with Rathan-Mayes

"Don't look at reading as boredom ... don't just read the 140 characters on social media; read things that are going to add to your knowledge base, because knowledge is power," Jones said.

Rathan-Mayes does not see reading to children as a burden, but instead as an opportunity to help.

"I think it is kind of like my calling, to be able to help, to help kids, to help with literacy," said Rathan-Mayes, who frequently visits Oak Ridge Elementary to read to the students.

Derrick Coles, the director of student service at Florida State, knows Rathan-Mayes has taken a liking to the students.

"Xavier has really grown fond of the students at Oak Ridge Elementary, and the students really enjoy his presence," said Coles.

Good is never good enough for the Florida State Seminoles, and that philosophy is embraced on and off the court. There is another way the Seminole men's basketball team can be active in the community and give back to the people who give so much of themselves to all of the sports programs at Florida State.

"I think we always have to find ways to try to better our community, our society and to the young people coming behind us," Jones said.

Moving forward, Rathan-Mayes and Jones would like to see more involvement in the program from the Florida State community.

"I'd like to see more emphasis be out there in the public eye and more people realizing this is a great cause to get behind," Jones said.

Florida State fans and the members of the loyal Tallahassee community can easily become involved by donating books or coming to games when the Coaching for Literacy program is promoted.

"Florida State and Coach Stan Jones set an incredible example for their involvement in the Fight for Literacy," said Ryan Viner, executive director of Coaching for Literacy.

## **Bacon A Different Player Entering His Second Season**

Dwayne Bacon entered the NBA Draft and withdrew from it in less than a week in late March.

The sophomore said the decision to return to Florida State for his second season was one he made himself out of a desire to improve.

"I really didn't get any feedback," Bacon said of the NBA Draft process. "I just knew I wanted to get better on my own. It was my decision because I want to fully develop as a player before I go into the league.

"I am just focused on my game and my season right now," Bacon added.

The 6-foot-7, 221-pound wing admits that he is a much different player today than he was when he stepped on campus a little over a year ago.

"It is different because I know so much more," Bacon said. "Having been here a year, I am experienced. I am able to use my voice more and be a leader. I've also been working all summer and feel like I've gotten a lot better.

"A lot has changed," Bacon added.

While one may think the pressures of improving NBA Draft stock while also trying to return FSU to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in five seasons would weigh heavily on Bacon, it is clear it doesn't. In fact, he seems to be entering the season with a general calmness about himself, his game and what he hopes will be his team.

"There is a lot less pressure for me because we have a lot more guys that can help us in a lot of different situations this year," Bacon said. "Our freshmen are very, very talented. ... There are like eight new guys this year, so we have a lot of great additional new talent and our depth is better. The deeper you are, the better you are as a team.

"Combining that with the returning talent, those guys have been working so hard over the summer, and I feel like we are going to be good," Bacon said. "I feel like we can be something special this year. I want to help lead us to what we can be as a team."

Bacon has already begun to use his voice more. Not only in practice, but just in speaking with his teammates. He went out of his way to install some knowledge upon his new teammates about life as a Seminole, working with Leonard Hamilton and his staff.

"I talked to them about a few things," Bacon said of speaking with the newcomers. "I shared with them how things are going to go with the coaches. I spoke to them about the tone they are going to hear things at and to not take it as a negative, because last year I took some of those things as a negative to me and my game. It wasn't like that at all. When I matured, I realized that.

"So I was just helping those guys with sharing what I now know – don't take the yelling as a negative, take it as a positive," Bacon added. "The coaches are trying to make you a better player for when the game time comes."

As for his individual game, Bacon averaged 15.8 points and 5.8 rebounds per game last season, but was just 44.7% from the floor and 28.1% from deep. He is looking to improve upon those numbers this season.

"The way I worked all summer, I feel like I got extremely better with my shot, my defense and I am going to continue to work all season and get better as the season goes on," Bacon said. "I would have to say my shooting is my biggest

improvement. I've been working on my shooting all summer. I worked a lot with Coach CY (Charlton Young) on that. I worked on my form, how I hold it, my follow through, everything."

"I've been working a lot on it," Bacon added about his shot. "I've worked on it so much that I feel the improvements are now my natural shot."

Bacon said he is shooting an average of 600 shots per day right now in the gym outside of practice. But it hasn't been only about offense for Bacon. He has also focused on improving his defensive effort and fundamentals.

"I've definitely gotten a lot better on defense," Bacon said. "Getting to my spots, defending the ball, on-ball more, defending it better. I feel a lot better overall on the defensive side.

"Deflections, blocking shots, getting it back and into transition," Bacon said of some defensive goals. "If I am strong on the defensive side of things, it will definitely help my offensive game too."

Most of all for Bacon, the 2016-17 season is about making a long-term mark on the program. He now fully grasps what it takes to find success on the court on a daily basis.

"A leader. Trying to be more active in the games. Trying to be a monster on defense and offense. Just having a different mentality for the game," Bacon said of how he is approaching the season. "I want to get everybody involved. A happy teammate that wants to keep everybody up. I want to be a big-time leader and a big-time player for everything I can do for the game.

"I am hungry for it," Bacon added.
